Annual Meeting Report

Board of Trustees President Anna Hogarty called the meeting to order at 2:10 pm on December 5, 2010, in the Herndon Gallery in Antioch College's South Hall. The minutes of the 2009 Annual Meeting were approved, and Ken Huber, Treasurer, gave the financial report.

The membership committee gave its report. Three motions were approved by the membership. First was the establishment of a new membership category, Business Membership, with annual dues of \$100.00. Second was to establish membership to follow the calendar year. Therefore, one is a member from January 1 through December 31 and will receive membership requests at the beginning of the year. The third motion was that anyone donating \$15.00 or more to the Center becomes a member. This ends the awkward issue of someone receiving a membership request immediately after they donate to the annual appeal.

After the membership report, Executive Director David Scott spoke. He thanked the membership and reflected on his four months at the helm.

Shirl LeVesconte, chair of the Board Development Committee, thanked out-going Board Members and introduced the slate of new Board Members nominated by the Nominating Committee. The membership voted to accept the slate with no new nominations from the floor. The changes on the Board are reported elsewhere in this newsletter.

Upon completion of Board business, Activities Coordinator Corinne Pelzl introduced Mark Twain, portrayed by actor Stephen Hollen, who gave a humorous talk enjoyed by approximately sixty people in attendance. Refreshments were donated by CJ's Southern Cooking and The Emporium.

In 2009 (the Center's 50th Anniversary), Mary chaired the most successful Annual Appeal ever, raising the greatest amount of money and recording gifts from the greatest number of contributors! This owed much to the wonderful kick-off program success organized by Mary, Senior Voices Out Loud, which featured some of our very talented senior performers. In 2010, when she was already serving on the Search Committee that worked non-stop for about four months, Mary was literally drafted in mid-year to co-chair the Annual Appeal. Now, with a short time to go, the Annual Appeal is almost to our goal. I am thinking it would be very appropriate to contribute or make a second contribution to honor the work of these outgoing Board members... Mary, we thank you.

2010: An Amazing year for The Yellow Springs Senior Center

With great rejoicing and a big sigh of relief we began 2010 with secure funding from the successful Greene County Senior Services Levy renewal and our largest ever Annual Appeal fund drive. Our new bylaws were in place and Anna Hogarty was elected President of the Board of Trustees.

An astonishing number of programs and activities (you see the regulars-- knitting, ping-pong, flexercise, etc., in every Senior Notes such as

calendar) resumed but new ones such as language classes, Friday lunches and Poetry Reading are frequently added. There are nearly twenty choices for members and townspeople, plus special events such as the Ice Cream Social and the Weavers' Open House. All of our classes and programs are staffed by volunteer leaders, teachers and crafters. We are so fortunate to have such skilled and generous people making this wide variety possible.

In February, the world stopped turning for just a nanosecond when our long time Executive Director, Rodney Bean, announced he was retiring effective May 28th. We took a very deep breath and formed the Succession Planning Committee. This Committee collected a lot of information from members, staff, stakeholders and Board members about their perceptions of the strengths and weaknesses of the current operation and their hopes, needs, wishes and suggestions regarding the characteristics to be sought in a new Executive Director. When all of this information was summarized, the Board and the newly formed Search Committee had a pretty good picture of the Director we'd like to hire. To give this Committee time to find the best possible candidates, we created a job description and task list for an Interim Coordinator and hired Barbara Mann, Transportation Coordinator, to fill this position in addition to her usual duties. Barbara did an admirable job of keeping everything running smoothly.

A Farewell Reception for retiring Director Rodney Bean with a proclamation from the Mayor declaring the day Rodney Bean Day took place in the decorated Great Room on May 28. Members, friends, family and others came from far and near, many writing in the guest journal their personal stories of appreciation for his outstanding service during the past eleven years.

The Search Committee, working throughout the summer, included Trustees, an elected staff representative, and townspeople. Ads and notices went to area newspapers and all the local colleges. Over forty applications were received. Screening teams carefully evaluated each one. Interviews shortened the list to four finalists. (One withdrew due to family illness.). The three finalists were interviewed by the staff and all of the Trustees and were then presented to the community where they were given time to make presentations and answer

questions. The Trustees received lots of feedback before selecting David Scott, who was the favorite candidate of a large majority of interested people. David was hired on a part-time basis (thirty hours per week) on August 23, 2010. National Senior Citizens Center Month was just the right time for a welcoming party for our new Executive Director and for viewing the considerable remodeling of the Center that had been made possible by a grant. Many people came to meet David and see our new offices and the handsome Art Gallery. It was a festive occasion.

A well-attended presentation given by Dr. Jeanne Lemkau, a local psychologist, about the Challenges of Aging has led to continuing programs on positive aging. Our super Treasurer, Ken Huber, secured a new auditing firm that discovered overpaid taxes bringing us a sizable tax refund. A year-end grant from the Greene County Council on Aging provided some new computers, a network for all staff computers, the new printer/copier, and a low water use toilet for the women's rest room!

Our membership has grown to 423 of which 69 are new this year. Our volunteers are too numerous to count. They are drivers, front desk receptionists, Annual Appeal letter and Senior Notes processors as well as all those serving on active committees. At an all-day Trustees Retreat, held at Friends Care, objectives for the year 2011 (see page 4) were chosen. Three new Trustees, Carol Gasho, Paul Ford and Bob Huston along with Andrée Bognár returning for a second 3-year term were elected at the Annual Membership meeting held on December 5, at Herndon Gallery on the Antioch Campus. We anticipate a year of progressive changes and accelerated growth.

The year 2010 was a heavy work year for the Trustees and staff calling for lots of patience from the membership, but all in all it has earned the title "An Amazing Year."

Amazing year, continued:

The volunteer drivers in the Transportation Program did a magnificent job of providing approximately 1800 rides to Yellow Springs seniors and disabled passengers in 2010. Very few ride requests had to be turned down due to lack of a

driver because these incredible people were always willing to pitch in and get folks where they needed to go for medical needs, social services, Senior Center programs, and shopping. Some of the drivers even used their own cars in service of the program when three passengers needed to go in three different directions at once. Since we have no local taxis and no regular bus service, the Senior Center Transportation Program is essentially THE transportation network in Yellow Springs. When you realize that this program has no paid drivers and instead relies on volunteers, it is absolutely mind-boggling!

YSSC 2011 Objectives

The following Objectives for 2011 were adopted by the Board of Trustees:

1. Provide Senior Center employees with paid personal time off.

Assigned to: Personnel Committee, Treasurer and Director.

2. Decide on a site for a new facility.

Assigned to: Director and Board Committee.

Implementation: The Board of Trustees will examine the feasibility of a new building. The Director will present the Board with 4-5 options for possible sites and the probable costs for each. If the Board decides in favor of a new site, the President will appoint a Task Force to prepare a plan for securing the necessary capital.

3. Develop programs for lifelong learning and community building in partnership with other local organizations.

Assigned to: Director.

4. Increase funding for the Center.

Assigned to: Fund Raising Committee, YSSC Board and Director

Implementation:

- a) Lobby the Village and Township to include support for the Senior Center in their annual budgets.
- b) Add at least 300 names to the Annual Appeal database.
- c) Hold one or more major (big-ticket) fundraiser events.

Transportation News

- If you are getting a ride from the YSSC transportation service during the winter months, it is important that you have clear access for the car and driver to pick you up. Make sure that the snow and ice are removed from your driveway and sidewalk.
- In January, Greene CATS is beginning a new flex-service route between Dayton and Xenia. The service will operate between Xenia Towne Square (in front of Kmart) and Miami Valley Hospital with scheduled stops at the Children's Medical Center, Wright Stop Plaza in downtown Dayton, and Sinclair Community College. Buses will run on weekdays every 90 minutes with the first bus leaving Xenia at 6:18 am and the last bus leaving Miami Valley Hospital at 5:46 pm. The trip to MVH takes about an hour and the trip home is slightly over 30 minutes since no stops are made on the return. The cost is \$1.50 each way (75 cents for elderly and disabled riders). The flex-service buses will deviate as much as $\frac{3}{4}$ mile to pick up or discharge passengers at other points along the route. If you have an appointment at Miami Valley Hospital or at a doctor's office, that is no more than $\frac{3}{4}$ mile off this route, we may encourage you to use this service in order to allow us to serve more clients. Our driver will take you to Xenia Towne Square to connect with it. Brochures for the route will be available in January and we will make sure to pick up some for the Senior Center.

Home Assistance Program

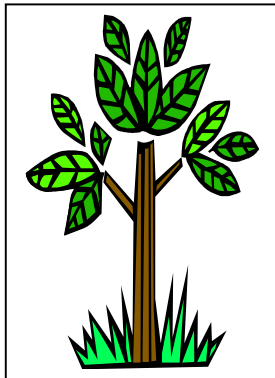
Happy New Year! Let's hope 2011 is a year of health and happiness for all of us. The New Year will bring changes for the Home Assistance Program in that Caroline and I will become employees of the Yellow Springs Senior Center. Since its inception in 1998, the Home Assistance Program has been a service of the Friends Health Care Association. The Friends Care Board started the program 13 years ago with grant funding from local foundations. The program has always been housed at the Senior Center and since 2000 has had additional funding from the Greene County Council on Aging (GCCOA).

As of January 1, the YSSC will assume oversight of the program and will continue to receive financial support from Friends Care Community and the Greene County Council on Aging. We are pleased to continue to provide the same service and support and caregivers and do not anticipate any major changes in the program. We consult with local elders and caregivers on various issues such as home care services, insurance concerns including Medicare and Medicaid, helpful programs for housing repairs and help with heating bills, Advanced Directives, and many others. 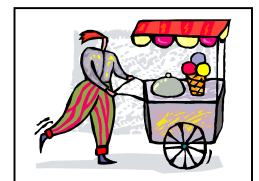
Hypnosis for Positive Change
